

The music department will feature performances from the symphonic wind ensemble, jazz band, Treble Singers women's choir, Una Voce chamber choir, string ensemble, flute choir and Collegians Chorale choir. One highlight from the jazz band is the return of previous and current directors. Dr. Jeremy Smith will play trombone, Mr. Rick Brunetto will play drums, and Dr. Issac Winland will play the trumpet.

Dr. John Packard, who is the music department chair and the director of the symphonic wind ensemble and pep band, is excited to bring the musical ensembles together for a night of harmony between the groups. Packard's main goal for the homecoming concert is for the audience to enjoy the musical stylings of
